

# Stop Baltimore County's Dangerous Peeping Tom Law

Maryland's Baltimore County Council members will introduce a bill that will protect sexual preference and gender identity from "discrimination." Sponsored by Council member Tom Quirk, the new law, if passed, will legally protect cross-dressers and transvestite behavior by forbidding discrimination against men who self-identify as women. This dangerous Peeping Tom bill will allow cross-dressing men to enter women's bathrooms and dressing rooms even if they are sexually attracted to women. Transvestites like [Robert Domasky](#) can dress as women in order to gain access to high school locker rooms. Cross-dressing is a mental illness, which can constitute a form of erotic fetish.

A similar "gender identity" bill was rejected by the Maryland Assembly last year when it realized that the Boy Scouts could be forced to hire cross-dressing women as Scout leaders. And unlike the [Baltimore City](#) gender identity law which provides exemptions for religious, educational, and toilet facility settings, the Baltimore County bill does not.

**Also attend the hearings on this bill. You do not need to be a Baltimore County resident to attend; this will impact all Marylanders if passed because it will create credibility for a state-wide bill. Come at least 20 minutes before each meeting to sign up and make public comments (2 minutes) or read a speech before the Council. It is important to have comments about the dangers of the bill:**

**Tuesday, January 17, 2012 at 6 PM -- Bill is introduced**

**Tuesday, February 14, 2012 at 2 PM -- Work Session to discuss the bill**

**Tuesday, February 21, 2012 at 6 PM -- Legislative Session to vote on the bill**

### **TALKING POINTS**

- Gender identity disorder is a treatable mental illness. Similarly, mentally ill persons who identify as royalty, famous individuals, or another race are not protected from "discrimination" by the government. We must ask our elected officials to deal with reality or the consequences to our community and families will linger on for generations because the bill forces citizens to disregard gender reality, which is humanly impossible. Forcing racial minorities and women to recognize transvestite men as women and share toilet facilities endangers females and their sense of well-being.
- Chrissy Lee Polis, a cross-dressing male, was assaulted by two African-American women after he attempted to access the ladies room at a McDonald's. Polis has since been arrested for disorderly conduct in a separate incident. Why doesn't the Council consider a mental health bill to help Polis and other transgenders?
- Transgender laws are not only unsafe, but open the door to teaching our children that gender is all in the mind and depends on one's perception. Transgendered persons need compassion and treatment, not bills sanctioning their illness. This bill mandates a bad law that does not help transgenders or society.
- In Montgomery County, Maryland, transgenders assaulted citizens who were trying to collect signatures to place that county's unpopular gender identity law on referendum so that the public could vote on it. That [case](#) is now before the Maryland Board of Ethics.
- Businesses, including small mom-and-pop employers, are at risk of being sued for thousands of dollars by transvestites under this "gender identity or gender expression" non-discrimination bill. Women don't want men in the women's bathrooms or dressing rooms, yet businesses will be sued if they refuse men access to these public accommodations. Schools, daycare centers, and churches will also face lawsuits for not hiring cross-dressers.

**Please contact the Baltimore County Council today** and ask them to stop unsafe and discriminatory bill Human Relations Bill No. 3-12, and please **attend hearings on the bill to** read a two minute speech or speak against the bill before the Council.
